

Rain woes in Arunachal Pradesh



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Heavy rains and landslide trigger huge havoc in [Arunachal](#) Pradesh throwing [normal](#) life out of gear. Flood [waters](#) are believed to have damaged many culverts, buildings. Landslide have added to the woes in the hills [state](#). The worst-hit districts include Seijosa in East Kameng district which remains cut off from the rest of the [state](#).

Landslide seems to have paralyzed [normal](#) life at Talom Riktak near Taliha while flood scene takes grim turn in [Namsai](#) district where the river Noa [Dihing](#) has been flowing abide the [danger level](#). Several areas in [Namsai](#) District flooded [as](#) Noa-Dehing river overflows. The flood water inundates Mahadevpur-I, Mahadevpur-IV and Kakoni villages besides submerging paddy fields in [Namsai](#) district.

Same scene prevails in in Lohit district where all rivers are overflowing. It would take time for the authorities to restore normalcy in the affected areas.

According to reports, the Durra Nala micro hydel project owned electricity lines have collapsed at Changliang in [Tezu](#) following heavy [landslip](#).



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
